

About Greens Coulee

Greens Coulee Park is a scenic bluffland nature preserve located in the City of Onalaska and the Mississippi River valley. Acquired in 2009 with the assistance of Wisconsin's Knowles-Nelson Stewardship Program, and the Doris Duke Charitable Foundation, this was the first purchase made under a cooperative agreement between the City of Onalaska and the Conservancy. The property rises over 400 feet above the adjacent valley bottom, and hiking trails run from the wetlands area at the lower end of the park through areas of oak savanna to rock quarries at the summits of the two bluffs. The southern bluff is one of the highest points in the Coulee Region.

Greens Coulee Park protects a scenic ridgeline peak described in Hamlin Garland's *A Son of the Middle Border* as well as high quality dry prairie communities in three locations. These remnant prairies are important because less than one tenth of one percent of the prairie present 200 years ago remains today. The dry cliffs feature numerous fissures, crevices, and honeycombing.

The land includes rare natural communities such as dry bluff prairie and globally imperiled oak savanna. The variety of blooming plants, the massive oak trees, the mushroom-shaped rock formations, and fabulous views from the prairies are all spectacular.

Public Access

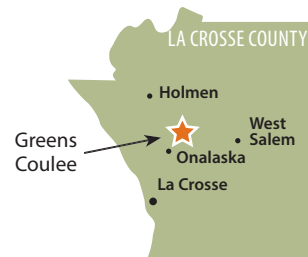
Greens Coulee Park is owned and maintained by the City of Onalaska and much of it is permanently protected by Mississippi Valley Conservancy. The land is managed as natural habitat and is part of the larger City Greenway Project.

Hiking Greens Coulee

(Onalaska, WI)

Two trailheads allow access to many trails in Greens Coulee.

Stonebridge Ave parking area: Take Hwy 16 north to Hwy 157. Turn left and continue on Hwy 157/Hwy 53 North to the Main St exit. At the bottom of the ramp, turn right at the light. At the roundabout turn onto Green Coulee Rd.* Go .6 mi to Clearwater Dr. Turn right and go .2 mi to Stonebridge Ave. Turn left and go .25 mi to the trailhead and a small parking lot on the right.

Clifford Dr parking area: Follow the directions above to *. Then go 1.25 mi and turn right on Clifford Dr. The trailhead is at the Clifford Dr cul-de-sac, and you may park there from May through October.

Three interesting hikes:

1 2 3 5 3 2 1 An out-and-back 1.2-mi (round trip) route that climbs 300 feet to an overlook at **5**.

1 2 3 4 6 7 6 10 2 1 This sometimes-challenging 1.4-mi lollipop-plus route takes you past a mushroom-shaped rock formation at **4**, a lovely view of the valley nearby, past another interesting rock formation north of **6**, and along a ridge to a beautiful overlook at **7** (the highest point on the property at 1212 feet). Retrace your steps to **6** and then go to **10** and take a lower route back to **2** and the beginning.

8 9 10 6 7 6 11 9 8 This 1.2-mi loop-plus route takes you up a steep trail to an overlook at **7**, the highest point on the property, then down a gentle slope to the beginning.
